As the nation's largest four-year public institution of higher education and an essential contributor to California's economy, the California State University works hand-in-hand with government at every level. As a state system, the California Legislature and <u>Gov. Gavin Newsom</u> are the top priorities of the CSU's Office of <u>Advocacy and State Relations</u>, where you can find information on legislation being tracked, budget issues and other student success priorities.

CSUDH is already designated by the federal government as one of its <u>U.S. Hispanic Serving</u> <u>Institutions (HSI)</u> and <u>U.S. Minority Serving Institutions (MSI)</u> and in 2025 will apply for the newly created through state law <u>California Black Serving Institutions (BSI)</u> designation.







Established in 2016, the **California Secretary of State (SOS) Students Vote Project (SVP)** is a statewide nonpartisan program that elevates college student voices and promotes civic engagement efforts to build a more inclusive democracy.

CSUDH significantly increased its student voter registration from 86 in the 2020 Presidential Election to 262 in the 2024 Presidential Election. FEDERAL

CSUDH was able to secure a \$700,000 Community Project Funding allocation from Rep. Nanette Barragan for the College of Health, Human Services, and Nursing. Currently, CSUDH has received \$55 million from <u>Federal Grant Making Agencies</u> and continues to perform outstanding research and student service programs.

Federal Gift and Travel Rules

The California State University is an entity that employs federal lobbyists and is registered as such under the <u>Lobbying Disclosure Act</u>. Therefore, the CSU and all CSU employees are subject to a detailed and complicated set of restrictions when it comes to providing gifts and travel to members of Congress or Congressional staff. These limitations can be found in the ethics rules of the <u>House</u> and <u>Senate</u>. <u>This CSU Guidance Sheet</u> [PDF] provides summary information and basic guidance about those rules.



The Office of Government and Community Relations is the university's primary liaison to the community, building partnerships with local community groups, nonprofits, and legislators.
