This interdepartmental field of concentration was formerly closely tied to the Economics Department and the title reflected this emphasis on economic theory and practice. All of the required courses in the program prior to 1971-72 were economics courses.

There has been a re-orientation of the program's content de-emphasizing economics while broadening the field by requiring the student to choose courses from Sociology, Geography, History, Philosophy, and Political Science.

The Interdepartmental committee feels that the program title should reflect this new emphasis on the interaction of American Business with other elements in our Society.

### AMERICAN BUSINESS AND SOCIETY

An Interdepartmental Field of Concentration

The interdepartmental field in American Business and Society is designed to provide a broad understanding of the American business system in terms of the internal decision-making process and in terms of its current and historical social environment.

REQUIREMENTS FOR THE INTERDEPARTMENTAL FIELD OF CONCENTRATION
IN AMERICAN BUSINESS AND SOCIETY

Course requirements are intended to meet specific objectives consistent with the general goals of the program. It is recommended that courses be taken in the order suggested below.

 To provide an understanding of the economic role of the business enterprise, that is, to demonstrate the role of the firm in combining and allocating scarce resources in such ways as to optimize production efficiency and consumer satisfaction, students are required to take:

American Business and Society 200 - Introduction to American Business and Society

- 2. Two components provide an understanding of the management function:
  - a. To convey an understanding of how decisions affecting the firm's primary economic functions are made, two courses are required:

Business Administration 210 - Management & Organizational Behavior Economics 215 - American Economic History

b. To explore the role of the individual in the modern business enterprise and to see how the individual is accommodated by the organization and the kinds of concessions he is required to make, one course is required:
