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Alcohol/Drug Counseling Certificate Program Summer 1992

The Certificate Program in Alcohol/Drug Counseling consists of nine courses designed to prepare individuals to enter the field at a professional level. All courses provide Continuing Educational Units (CEUs) for registered nurses and teachers. Courses may be taken on an individual basis without formal entrance into the Certificate Program with permission of the **Program Coordinator. Students** may begin the program in the Fall or Spring Semester. Upon satisfactory completion of all nine courses, in the sequence outlined below, with a 2.5 grade point average, the student will receive a Certificate as recognition of educational achievement and professional status. The Certificate is widely recognized by alcoholism treatment centers.

Applicants should have completed at least 2 years of college or have at least 2 years of work experience in a health or human service agency. If applicant is a recovering substance abuser, two years of continuous sobriety is required. Prospective students must complete an application form and supply transcripts and letters of recommendation. Applicants will be admitted initially on a conditional basis and are required to pass the introductory class AD X301 with a "C+" or better.

The fee is \$90 per unit; a three-unit course is \$270. Tuition fees must be paid upon admission into program. Classes are held from 6:30 - 9:30 p.m. weeknights on the CSU Dominguez Hills campus in Carson.

SEMESTER I

AD X300 3 ext units credit This course provides basic information about alcohol: the physiological, psychological and sociological effects of alcohol abuse; identification of social drinking, problem drinking; etiological theories of alcoholism; defense mechanisms; the counseling relationship and basic treatment issues.

Intro to Counseling Techniques

AD X301 3 ext units credit This course introduces the skills and techniques necessary for counseling. Students will learn to use active listening skills and to develop a high empathy level. The course is both theoretical and experiential.

SEMESTER II Counseling the Individual

AD X302 3 ext units credit This course develops an understanding of the psychological factors in alcoholism and drug abuse and their implications for treatment. Counseling techniques are examined and practiced including assessment, perception and communication skills required for various stages of treatment, prognosis and termination.

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Perspectives on Drug Abuse: Counseling the Substance Abuser

AD X303 3 ext units credit This course is an introduction to this major social/ psychological problem. Students learn the basic pharmacology of the commonly encountered street drugs and behavioral and physiological consequences of drug abuse. Poly-addiction and treatment modalities are also covered.

SEMESTER III •

Group Counseling Techniques

AD X304 3 ext units credit This course provides an understanding of group dynamics, defenses, problems, goals and growth. The roles of the group facilitator and group members are examined and practiced in class.

Introductory Practicum

AD X305 2 ext units credit This course introduces the student to the applied counseling experience. They become knowledgeable about community resources, learn documentation techniques, charting, and case studies. Issues related to grief, loss, stress, and counselor burn-out are addressed.

● SEMESTER IV ●

Family Dynamics

AD X306 3 ext units credit This course introduces theories of the effects of substance abuse (alcohol and/or drugs) as they relate to the family system. Students gain insight into the identification and solution of problems of the pathologic family and the individual roles and behavior patterns that exist within it.

Advanced Practicum

AD X307 2 ext units credit This course demonstrates how to link clients with community resources. The student learns charting techniques, becomes aware of the needs of special populations and develops a further understanding of the counselor-client relationship, including confidentiality and legal aspects. The student learns about the multi-disciplinary treatment team, how to take histories and make psychosocial evaluations. The various alcoholism treatment agencies and program modalities-their staffing, funding, operational procedures-are studied.

Treatment of Eating Disorders

AD X308 3 ext units credit An introduction to the treatment of eating disorders such as anorexia nervosa, bulimia, compulsive eating, and obesity. biological, psychoanalytic, behavioral, psychosocial, and other theoretical perspectives are explored. The history of the interrelationship of alcohol and food as substances sometimes abused is explored. The course will provide an overview of techniques necessary for counseling individuals with eating problems.

Gestalt Therapy with Children and Families

Seq No: 12-221-0546 Noncredit

Learn to apply the humanistic, experiential principles of Gestalt therapy to work with children, adolescents and families. The first section will focus on intervention strategies with children and adolescents. The use of art and play therapy, story writing, metaphors, board games and innovative approaches will be covered. Theory will be discussed briefly; most of the time will be spent experientially, and with demonstrations and discussions. A slide show of sand-tray work will be included. Attention will be paid to application of the approach to both short and long-term therapy.

The second section will explore theory and application to families. We will find how Gestalt therapy integrates with family system work, the therapist's use of self, how to include children in family therapy, and use with "non-traditional" families such as single-parent and step-families. There will be generous amounts of role playing and demonstration, and a video will be shown.

This NAUI Openwater I program qualifies participants for an entry level certification in scuba diving. Come closer to a wonderful new world of natural serenity and inspiring beauty--for many, the underwater experience has brought them closer to themselves, offering countless hours of rewarding recreational activity.

Instruction will be at a leisurely pace over 7 weeks to reduce stress associated with a shorter course. Required subjects will be covered in classroom sessions. Diving skills and procedures will be practiced to perfection in pool sessions. Practical application of concepts and skills will be developed in the ocean environment at various local beaches with a final training dive from a boat.

A medical examination is required. Participants should be able to swim and/or float comfortably in the water.


