### Dear Reader:

I would like to take a few lines at the beginning of our Winter Bulletin to share a few thoughts about Extended Education. A university is many things to a community, even a "community" as large as the South Bay. It is a sports venue, a cultural center, even open space to those who live around it. Fundamentally, though, it is a place of learning. For Extended Education, however, that notion of place is much broader than the campus in Carson. As you look through the Bulletin you hold in your hands, you will see classes offered in places guite distant from the campus. It is one of the purposes of Extended Education at Dominguez Hills to make university-level courses and programs available regardless of time or place, whether it is Redondo Beach or Ar Rivad. As a matter of fact, our students in Ar Riyad, Tokyo, Nisquit, Alaska and many other states in the United States and countries of the world enjoy a unique relationship with our full-time Dominguez Hills faculty through our world-wide Humanities External Baccalaureate and Masters Degrees. If you're closer to Redondo Beach than Ar Riyad, there is a full schedule of credit and non-credit classes being offered in our extension center in the Redondo Beach Community Center at Knob Hill Avenue and Pacific Coast Highway.

If you would rather be in Morelia, London, or Wuhan than Redondo Beach, Extended Education combines university programs with distant classrooms through its several residential travel programs. Credit and travel in England, China or Mexico in reasonably priced programs are described further along in this Bulletin.

But place is only one dimension of Extended Education; currency is another. Our programs are designed to meet current information and knowledge needs of people like yourself who work and live in Los Angeles. Whether for professional or purely academic purposes, courses and programs are planned to give you the most recent information or advances in research, like our annual tax institute, risk management certificate, or science programs.

We are also not bound by age. For the younger student, there is a full program of activities and courses to enhance their physical and mental development. These can be found in the Arts and the Lifestyle sections.

As you can see, there are many dimensions to Extended Education, each bringing fuller meaning to university education and its relevance to you. I hope you will take time to look carefully at what the staff of Extended Education at Dominguez Hills has prepared for you. If you have a need not met in these pages, please let me know. 

## General Information

### **SCHEDULE CHANGES**

Information in this *Bulletin* is subject to change without notice. We will attempt, however, to notify all early-registered students of any changes.

### **COURSE CANCELLATION**

All Extension courses are supported through student tuition. Courses with insufficient enrollment may be cancelled at the discretion of the Division of Extended Education.

### **ELIGIBILITY**

Anyone 18 years of age or older may enroll for Extension study. Formal admission to the University is not required. However, registration for some courses may be limited to those who have completed prerequisites, or who can demonstrate to the instructor's satisfaction equivalent preparation.

### **STANDARDS**

Degree-credit courses in Extension adhere to the academic standards of the University. All the activities usually associated with the regular University course-work are integral parts of the degree-credit instruction program.

### **EXTENSION FACULTY**

Extension faculty are either members of the resident faculty of the University or highly qualified persons.

### PARKING

Parking permits are required for on-campus classes. They are available from the machines at the entrance to each parking lot and cost 75 cents per day.

### **CLASS LOCATIONS**

Classes are scheduled at CSUDH or the off-campus sites as listed. The Redondo Beach Community Resource Center is located at 320 Knob Hill in Redondo Beach. The school is at the intersection of Pacific Coast Highway and Knob Hill.

### **DEGREE CREDIT**

University Extension is not a degree-granting institution. For more information on applicability of Open University units, refer to the Open University class schedule, available from the Extension office. The maximum Open University or Extension degree credit which may be used toward a bachelor's degree at CSUDH is 36 units and 13 quarter units toward a graduate degree. Extension degree credit is not acceptable for units in residence. Course numbering is X001-X399 for undergraduate and X400-X499 for graduate courses.

## UNIT VALUE OF DEGREE CREDIT

CSUDH is currently on the Quarter System, and all credit is offered in Quarter rather than Semester units. The following table should be used to convert Quarter to Semester units.

### **PROFESSIONAL CREDIT**

A few courses in this *Bulletin* are offered for Professional Credit in Education. Professional Credit is designed for professionals who benefit from credit for salary or step advancement. The awarding of professional credit requires completion of out-of-class assignments. Professional credit is not degree-applicable. **Course numbering is 800–899 for education professional credit.** 

### **NON-CREDIT**

Many of the short courses, workshops and seminars in this *Bulletin* are non-credit. These are designed to respond to the various educational interests and needs of those living and working in the University's service area. **Course numbering is 500–599.** 

## CONTINUING EDUCATION UNITS (CEU)

Some Extension workshops and courses award Continuing Education Units (CEU). The CEU is a nationally-recognized unit of measurement for programs applying toward relicensure, promotion or career advancement. One CEU equals ten hours of participation in lecture. CEUs are not degree-applicable. A cumulative permanent transcript of all CEU study undertaken is provided to Extension students upon written request. Course numbering is 900–999.

## EXTENSION GRADING PROCEDURES

Unless a course is offered for a grade of Credit/No Credit only, all Extension degree-credit and professional credit courses are offered for letter grades. However, an undergraduate student in an Extension class offered for letter grade may choose to be graded on the Credit/No Credit basis by informing the instructor in writing at the beginning of the class. For regular campus classes, follow University procedures.

### **TRANSCRIPTS**

A student may obtain an official transcript of his/her record by completing a Request for Transcript form, available from the Admissions and Records Office (Small College, J103). A fee of \$4 is charged for each transcript. Additional copies of transcripts prepared at the same time (up to 10), \$2.

### **GRADE REPORTS**

Grade Reports will be sent approximately three weeks after the term ends. Official transcripts with current grades will not be available for at least five weeks after the end of the term.

### LIBRARY SERVICES

Student identification cards — available at the Extension Office — will entitle you to full use of the Cain Educational Resources Center.

### **TEXTBOOKS**

Unless otherwise noted, textbooks may be purchased for most classes at the University Bookstore. Registration fees do not include textbooks unless otherwise noted.

### **PRE-REGISTRATION**

Pre-registration is highly recommended for all classes and required by some. By completing the registration form and returning it with the required fees, you are assured a place in the class. You may register at the first meeting of most extension classes unless otherwise indicated.

**REGISTRATION BY MAIL:** Fill out the registration form and mail it with a check or money order to Extension Office, ERC C508, CSUDH, Carson, CA 90747. Please leave the mailing label intact.

**REGISTRATION BY PHONE:** You may register with a VISA or MasterCard by calling 213/516–3741, 8 a.m.–5:30 p.m., Monday through Thursday.

**REGISTRATION IN PERSON:** Fill out the Extension Registration Form and bring it with your fees to the Extension Office, ERC C508 (Library building, fifth floor, back corridor). The office is open Monday though Thursday, 8 a.m.–5:30 p.m.; Friday, 8 a.m.–5 p.m.

You will not receive a confirmation of registration and should attend the first class meeting at the date and time listed in this *Bulletin* unless otherwise notified by the Extension Office.

## REGISTRATION PROCEDURES

Follow the three steps below. If you have any questions call the Extension office at 213/516–3741.

**SELECT** the classes in which you wish to enroll.

FILL OUT the registration form on the back cover, including class sequence number.

MAIL TO, WALK IN, OR CALL

the Extension office to register. Be sure to include your check with the appropriate amount of fees payable to CSUDH. When registering by phone please have your VISA or MasterCard number and expiration date available. Minimum credit card registration is \$30.

The Extension Office is located in ERC C508, Library Building, fifth floor, south corridor.

### WITHDRAWAL

Official withdrawal from a course is determined by the date on which the Division of Extended Education, California State University, Dominguez Hills, receives written request for your withdrawal.

### FEES

Registration fees for Extension **credit** classes are normally \$41.50 per unit. Some courses may have differential fees. The fees for each course are listed in this *Bulletin*. The fees are the same for residents and non-residents. Payment may be made by check, money order or VISA/MasterCard draft, payable to CSUDH in the exact amount required. Registration will not be considered complete until the check has been honored by the bank on which it is drawn.

### RECEIPTS

Receipts for payment of fees will *not* be automatically issued unless by written request. If you intend to obtain reimbursement for fees from your employer, your cancelled check or credit card statement must serve this purpose.

### **REFUND OF FEES**

Refunds are granted in accordance with the State refund schedule.

- If you withdraw prior to the first class meeting, 100 percent of the course fee will be refunded.
- If an Extension course is discontinued, the entire course fee will be automatically refunded.
- If you withdraw after the first class (before the first 25 percent of the course has elapsed), 65 percent of the total fee will be refunded.
- After 25 percent of the course time has elapsed, no refund will be made.
- Courses of four meetings duration or less, no refund.

Refunds are not automatic; you must file appropriate forms in the Extension Office in order to receive a refund. Refunds take a minimum of four to six weeks for processing.

## CERTIFICATE IN ALCOHOLISM/DRUG COUNSELING

The Certificate Program in Alcoholism/Drug Counseling consists of nine courses designed to prepare individuals to enter the field at a professional level.

### **ENTRANCE REQUIREMENTS**

Applicants must have completed at least two years of college and have at least two years of work experience in a health or human service agency.

Two years continuous sobriety is required. With the permission of the Program Coordinator, students not meeting the minimum entrance requirements may be conditionally admitted based on a combination of education and experience. New classes begin in the Fall and Spring quarters.

Prospective students must complete an application form and supply transcripts and letters of recommendation. Applicants will be admitted initially on a conditional basis and are required to pass the introductory class HEA X282 with a grade of BC or better.

### THE COURSES

Students must successfully complete all nine courses in the program in the sequence outlined below. No course waivers or substitutions are allowed. *All courses are degree applicable*.

### QUARTER I

## HEA X282 — INTRODUCTION TO COUNSELING TECHNIQUES (4 units)

This course introduces the skills and techniques necessary for counseling the alcohol and drug abuser. Students will learn to use active listening skills and to develop a high empathy level. The course is both theoretical and experiential.

### HEA X280 — INTRODUCTION TO ALCOHOLISM (4 units)

This course provides basic information about alcohol: the physiological, psychological and sociological effects of alcohol abuse; identification of social drinking, problem drinking; etiological theories of alcoholism; defense mechanisms; the counseling relationship and basic treatment issues.

### **QUARTER II**

### HEA X281 — COUNSELING THE INDIVIDUAL (4 units)

This course develops an understanding of the psychological factors in alcoholism and drug abuse and their implications for treatment. Counseling Techniques are examined and practiced including assessment, perception and communication, skills required for various stages of treatment, prognosis and termination.

## HEA X296 — PERSPECTIVES ON DRUG ABUSE: COUNSELING THE SUBSTANCE ABUSER (4 units)

This course is an introduction to this major social/psychological problem. Students learn the basic pharmacology of the commonly-encountered street drugs and the behavioral and physiological consequences of drug abuse. Poly-addiction and treatment modalities are also covered.

### QUARTER III

### HEA X300 — GROUP COUNSELING TECHNIQUES (4 units)

This course provides an understanding of group dynamics, defenses, problems, goals and growth. The roles of the group facilitator and group members are examined and practiced in class.

### HEA X301 — INTRODUCTORY PRACTICUM (2 units)

This course introduces the student to the applied counseling experience. They become knowledgeable about community resources, learn documentation techniques, charting, and case studies. Issues related to grief, loss, stress, and counselor burn-out are addressed.

### **QUARTER IV**

### HEA X283 — **DYNAMICS OF THE FAMILY** (4 units)

This course introduces theories of the effects of substance abuse (alcohol and/or drugs) as they relate to the family system. Students gain insight into the identification and solution of problems of the pathologic family and individual roles and the behavior patterns that exist within it.

### HEA X302 — **PRACTICUM: FAMILY** (2 units)

This course covers the resources available to the family. The student learns charting techniques, becomes aware of the needs of special populations and develops a further understanding of the counselor-client relationship including confidentiality and legal aspects.

### QUARTER V

## HEA X303 — PRACTICUM: INDIVIDUAL AND GROUP COUNSELING (2 units)

This course demonstrates how to link clients with community resources. The student learns about the multidisciplinary treatment team, how to take histories and make psycho-social evaluations. The various alcoholism treatment agencies and program modalities — their staffing, funding, operational procedures — are studied.

### **INSURANCE BILLING FOR MEDICAL OFFICES**

Billing third party insurance carriers is often one of the most challenging tasks confronted by medical office personnel. Sending claims in time and receiving maximum reimbursement is the goal of every insurance biller, and changing policies and procedures demand that offices keep informed of new requirements. This course takes the mystery out of insurance billing by helping you become more familiar with insurance billing procedures.

The seminar emphasizes MediCal and MediCare billing in addition to the total process of billing. The class will help you to understand how to maximize insurance reimbursements for your doctor and your patients.

## CERTIFICATE IN MEXICAN CULTURE

Sponsored by the Mexican American Studies program and the Division of Extended Education, this is a program of university credit courses primarily for persons interested in regaining an understanding of their inherited culture and language.

The program consists of three core courses and three complementary courses which examine Mexican history, literature and language. A certificate of completion is awarded upon fulfillment of program requirements. Students of the program achieve a perspective through which another culture can be assimilated. Furthermore, students are stimulated to continue their education at the college level. (All courses are offered for non-baccalaureate credit, but a student intending to apply these credits toward CSUDH course requirements may appeal on an individual basis.)

#### **CULTURA ESPAÑOLA**

### HUMANITIES EXTERNAL DEGREE PROGRAMS

The Master of Arts in the Humanities offers a broad interdisciplinary exposure to all the areas of the Humanities — history, literature, philosophy, music and art, — and the establishment of an integrative perspective among them with emphasis on their interrelating effects and influences. Students are able to specialize in a particular discipline of the Humanities, or in specific cultural thematic areas which could be traced across all of the humanistic disciplines.

An undergraduate concentration in the Humanities is not necessary for this Master's Degree program. The Master's of Arts in the Humanities is an external degree program for those who prefer an individualized approach to advanced education rather than traditional classroom courses on a college campus.

Independent study with frequent consultation with faculty is emphasized. Through tape, letter and phone correspondence with on-campus faculty, students are able to design and the complete program without having to travel to the campus.

Fees are \$65 per unit. Forty-five units are required for the degree. Admission to the program is available to students who hold a bachelor's degree and who want an individual education approach.

The Bachelor of Arts in the Humanities is an external degree program for those who have completed educational requirements for an Associate of Arts or its equivalent (two years of lower division college work, i.e., 84 quarter units or 56 semester units). It is for those who want

- intellectual stimulation in the Humanities — art, music, history, literature, philosophy
- · an accredited B.A. degree
- a program of study at homea self-paced course of study
- The major requires 90 upper division units, divided equally into three phases. Students progress from an initial highly structured series of courses to a faculty-guided independent plan of study. The major includes some courses which interrelate two or more subject areas to a specified topic or theme. ### MEXICO: MORELIA AND ITS ENVIRONS

-June 22 through July 20, 1986

Enjoy 28 days in Mexico studying Spanish and experiencing Mexican culture with Dr. Benjamin Peña. Explore the rich colonial and pre-Colombian traditions of Morelia and its surrounding villages and towns.

Morelia, capital of the state of Michoacan, is located in the beautiful central highland plateau of Mexico. There, among some of the finest colonial architecture in Mexico, participants in this program will live with selected Morelian families and attend morning classes in a beautifully maintained colonial building.

### STUDY PROGRAM

All participants will enroll for 8 units of university credit: either Spanish 130, Beginning Spanish; or Spanish 241, Advanced Conversation. Also, all participants will enroll in Spanish 220, Field Research; this course can be tailored to your professional or academic interests. All of these courses help you to use Spanish skills immediately in real-life situations. At least one year of college Spanish or consent of Dr. Peña is required to participate.



Dr. Benjamin Peña, faculty director of the program, is associate professor of Spanish at CSUDH and has extensive experience in teaching career-related Spanish.

#### **ACCOMMODATIONS**

The non-academic portion of the program, including the homestay program, the instructional facility, and the excursions are arranged and supervised by CECEMMAC (Centro de Conocimiento Expenenciales Multiculturals Mexicanos) an organization which specializes in educational travel programs to Mexico.

No more than two participants are placed in a home. The homestay arrangement enables students to practice Spanish and to learn about Mexican culture by living it. Participants will receive three meals daily. (Families with children can be accommodated, although host families are not responsible for baby sitting service.)

#### TRAVEL AND TOURS

Participants will fly from Los Angeles to Mexico City with a connecting flight to Morelia. In addition to discovering the cultural riches and natural beauty of Morelia, participants, with guides, will tour important historical and archeological sites in the region surrounding Morelia. Weekly one-day excursions include trips to: Santa Clara del Cobre, famous for handcrafted copperwork; Capula, known for its pottery; Tzin Tzun Tzan, a pre-Colombian archeological site featuring pyramids and a sacrificial altar; Janitzio, an island on Lake Pátzcuaro; Pátzcuaro, a fascinting city with a

wonderful museum of Mexican crafts. Two weekend overnight excursions include a trip to Guanajuato and a trip to Urupán. Other towns on the tour itinerary are Quiroga, Santa María de Guide and Zinapécuaro, Paricutin, Angahuan. Accommodations for the overnight excursions will be in tourist class hotels.

#### **COST OF PROGRAM**

Applicants must be 18 and hold a current passport. (Applicants under 18 and children may be accepted if accompanied by parent or guardian. Fee for children under 6 is approximately \$650 for air fare, lodging, meals and excursions; for children over 6 years, fees are approximately \$1,200.)

## **Open University**

Take advantage of hundreds of courses ideal for professional advancement, career change or personal enrichment. Through the Open University program, you can enroll in any regular CSUDH academic course without going through formal admission procedures. That means that in addition to the Extension classes featured in this *Bulletin*, most of the CSUDH academic curriculum is available to you.

### **EASY ACCESS**

Open University offers you freedom — the freedom to take classes evenings, weekends, or weekdays, and you don't have to take classes in consecutive quarters. Take one class or more; there is no minimum load requirement.

The only classes not open to you are those for which you haven't completed the required prerequisite. Also, you may not register for Open University if you are already enrolled in a CSUDH degree program.

Simply follow the instructions below for Open University registration.

### CREDITS

Through Open University you can earn academic credit toward a degree, should you want to apply for admission to CSUDH at some later time. Up to 36 undergraduate units and 13 graduate units will be accepted as elective units for a degree at CSUDH.

Often credits earned through Open University are transferable to other colleges and universities — subject, of course, to their requirements. Open University credits do not satisfy CSUDH residence requirements but are accepted as elective units. CSUDH records your Open University degreeapplicable credits in your student file. For a \$4 fee, payable to the Cashier's Office, you can obtain a transcript of the Open University classes you have completed.

### **OTHER BENEFITS**

Open University gives you the freedom to:

- Sample a particular field before enrolling in a degree program
- Take courses for professional or personal development
- Improve your grade point average if you have been turned down for admission by the university or have been academically disqualified

## Registering for Open University

## 1. Fill out the Open University Registration form.

Use the Extension form on the back cover of this catalog, or pick up additional forms at the University Information Center (in front of the campus, near the flagpole) or at the Extension Office (ERC-C508).

2. Take the form to the first class meeting and have the instructor sign it. The instructor will sign your registration form (giving you permission to register) based on available space in the class. Regularly enrolled CSUDH students have first preference for registration; Open University students enroll on a space-available basis. You must also have satisfied any prerequisite requirements for the course. Mathematics courses require satisfaction of the University's entry level mathematics requirements.

3. Bring the form with the appropriate fee to the Extension Office.

Fees are \$41.50 per unit (\$166 for a 4-unit class). Fees should be paid by

check or money order, made payable to "CSUDH." Use your VISA or Master-Card to pay fees in person, or mail in your fees with your signed registration form to:

Cash payments will only be accepted for the exact amount. Those who register in person will receive fee receipts indicating your course enrollment and your student ID number. All classes will become part of your permanent academic record. You will receive an Extension Student ID card which entitles you to library privileges. If you choose to mail in your registration forms and fees, you can pick up your ID card at the Extension Office. We are unable to provide ID cards through the mail





### FROM PALOS VERDES




