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#### **Registration and Tuition**

#### Who May Register

College students, graduates of high school, or individuals sufficiently knowledgeable to profit from college courses may register for Summer Sessions. High school juniors and seniors, with letters of recommendation, may enroll in lower-division courses (see details on page 4). If you are a visiting student, it is especially important that you read the section on classification and numbering of courses. Descriptions of the courses are available in the University Catalog found in the University Bookstore.

Registration in CSUDH Summer Sessions courses does not constitute admission to the University as a regular student. If you are interested in admission to the University, inquire or apply at the University Information and Service Center, Small College Complex A-130, (310) 516-3696.

#### How to Register

**Registration in CSUDH Summer Sessions is** simple, and in most cases can be completed entirely through a mail-in procedure. Formal application to the University is not necessary, and transcripts are not required. Some Summer Sessions courses, however, have prerequisites or special qualifications which are noted in the Schedule of Courses. In certain cases, before the request to register can be processed, permission to enroll in a course must be obtained from the instructor or department office, or students may be asked to provide proof of completion of prerequisites. To attend Summer Sessions classes, registration for courses must be completed, including full payment of fees, by the appropriate deadline dates (refer to Calendar on page i). If you are registering for both Summer Sessions and University Extension courses, please use separate registration forms and write separate checks.

Include your check, money order or credit card information; do not send cash. The deadline for Mail-in Registration is May 20, 1994, two weeks before the First Session begins (consult calendar on page i).

#### To Register in Person:

You can register in person at the Summer Sessions Office located on the CSU Dominguez Hills campus, SCC B141. The Summer Sessions Office accepts

check, money order, cash (exact change), VISA and MasterCard.

#### Late Registration

(For adding courses to a program, see ADD Instructions.)

The late registration period begins June 7, and concludes June 17 for the First Session. Late registration begins June 28 and concludes July 8 for the Second Session. Completion of late registration is dependent upon availability of seats for each class and is subject to a \$25.00 late registration processing fee.

Non Standard Date or Intensive Courses In order to register for a course which begins after the first week of either Session, the student must complete the late registration procedure by the second day of this class.

#### **Tuition and Fees**

Fees and refunds are subject to change by the Trustees of the California State University. Full payment of all tuition and fees must be made at the time of registration or adding a course. Payment of tuition and fees may be made by check, money order, cash, (except mail-in registration) and VISA or MasterCard. Checks and money orders are payable to CALIFORNIA STATE UNIVERSITY, DOMINGUEZ HILLS. Until total fees are paid, registration is not valid.

#### **Tuition**

Total course fee is listed in the Schedule with the course information. Some courses, such as laboratory or activity courses, have higher costs and may have fees that are higher than the standard instructional fee.

#### **Returned Checks**

All returned checks, whether for insufficient funds or stop payments, are considered to be enforceable debts, and are subject to a \$10.00 fee. If your check is returned, your registration will not be processed.

#### Add / Drop / Withdrawal

#### **Adding Courses**

To add a course before the start of the Session, submit your completed Add / Drop Form and the additional tuition to the registrar in the Summer Sessions Office.

To add a course after the start of the Session, you must file a Change of Program form available in the Summer Sessions Office and have it signed by the professor for the class you want to add.

Courses may be added during the first two weeks of the session. The deadline for adding courses is June 17 for the First Session and July 8 for the Second Session.

Students may exchange one class for another within the same Session without penalty, if the unit and tuition value is the same.

If you will exceed a maximum unit load by adding courses, you must also submit a Petition to Exceed Maximum Units, available in the Summer Sessions Office (refer to policy on Maximum Unit Load).

#### NTE (NATIONAL TEACHER EXAM CORE BATTERY) TEST PREPARATION AND REVIEW

This session is designed to assist prospective teachers in preparing for the Core Battery of the NTE (Literature and Fine Arts, Mathematics, Science and Social Studies) by teaching techniques and strategies that will help student apply their skills and knowledge. A review of basic mathematics will be included. A one hour lunch break is given for each full-day class.

#### **Dropping / Withdrawing**

Non-attendance in class, notifying the instructor, or stopping payment on a check does NOT officially constitute dropping or withdrawing from a course. The Summer Sessions Office must be notified and appropriate forms must be completed.

#### **Dropping a Course**

If you decide to drop a course, you must file a Change of Program Form with the Summer Sessions Office. (if you are dropping all courses you enrolled in, follow withdrawal procedures.) Refer also to Refund policies.

**Drop, prior to first day of Session.** To drop a course before a Session begins, file a change of Program form and an Application for Refund of Fees in the Summer Session Office.

Drop, during the first two weeks of the Session. Summer Sessions students may drop or withdraw from any course prior to and during the first two weeks of a Session without permanent record of enrollment or "W" on transcript, and without the instructor's signature.

Drop, third through fifth weeks of the Session. During the third and until the final week of the Session, the instructor's and the school dean's or associate dean's signatures for each course are required on the Change of Program form in order to drop. Non-matriculated or Summer-only students need the signatures of the instructor and the Dean of Extended Education.

If a student drops or withdraws after the second week of a Session, a grade of "W" for the course(s) will appear on the student's permanent transcript.

## Complete Withdrawal from Session

To withdraw from all courses, complete and submit a Withdrawal form, and, if you are eligible for a refund, an application for a refund of fees. Withdrawal forms are available in the Summer Sessions Office.

**Complete withdrawal, prior to first day of Session.** If you find it necessary to drop all courses before a Session begins, you must cancel your registration and you may be eligible to receive a full refund of fees, less a nonrefundable processing fee. A completed Withdrawal Form and a refund Application must be received by the Summer Sessions Office by June 3 for First Session or by June 24 for Second Session.

Complete Withdrawal, during the first two weeks of the Session. You may withdraw during the first two weeks without a record of enrollment and without the instructor's signature. Complete a Withdrawal Form and a Refund Application and submit these forms to the Summer Sessions Office by the end of the second week.

Complete withdrawal, third through fifth week of the Session. A grade of "W" for each course appears on the permanent transcript if the student withdraws after the second week of the Session and is doing passing work. To withdraw from all courses after the second week of instruction, complete a Withdrawal form, obtain the signatures of the instructor and school dean (or Dean of Extended Education, if you are not a regular student) on the Withdrawal form. Submit these completed forms to the Summer Sessions Office.

Withdrawal from classes during final exam week (last week of Session) is not permitted, except in such cases as accident or serious illness where circumstances causing the withdrawal are clearly beyond the student's control, and the assignment of a grade of Incomplete is not practical. Such requests require a Petition with the signature and approval of of the instructor and school dean (Dean of Extended Education for Summeronly or non-matriculated students). The form is available in the Summer Sessions Office and must be filed in the Summer Sessions Office with documentation by the last day of the Session in which the student was enrolled.

#### **Refund Policy**

#### **Refund of Tuition Fee**

Refunds are not automatic. Even if the University cancels a scheduled course, you must make an application to have your tuition fees refunded. Refunds are subject to change without notice by the Trustees of California State University System. Amounts of refund are calculated according to the Formula for Refunds established in Title 5 of the California Administrative Code.

Refund Applications are available from the Summer Sessions Office. This form must be filed in person with the Summer Sessions Office. Your Schedule Confirmation and the tear off receipt from the Change of Program form (if applicable) must accompany the written request. No transaction will be made without a receipt. Students must submit refund requests by the published deadlines (refer to Calender and Refund Schedule). The effective date of the refund request, for purposes of calculating amount refunded, is the day it is received by the Summer Sessions Office.

Allow approximately six weeks from the date the request is received for processing refunds.

#### **Refund of Parking Fees**

Written application for a refund of parking fees must be accompanied by a permit or decal which the University has issued. Applications for refund is determined by the following policy: 50% of all remaining full weeks; however no refund for remaining periods of less than two weeks.

#### **Refund Schedule**

The formula used for calculating the amount of fees refunded for five weeks or longer sessions is as follows. If you apply for a refund prior to the first day of the Session, June 3 or June 24, you may receive total tuition minus \$10.00. If you apply for a refund on the first or second day of the Session, you may receive total tuition minus the fee for one unit. During the remainder of the first week of the Session, if you apply, you may receive total tuition minus one unit times 65 percent. During the second week of the Session, if you apply, you may receive total tuition minus one unit times 25 percent. After the second week, none of the fee may be refunded. The late registration fee is non-refundable.

Please note that tuition refunds are based upon the start date of the Session and not upon the first day a particular course meets.

#### **Cancelled Course Policy**

If you are enrolled in a course that is cancelled for any reason, you must complete an Application for Refund or arrange for another course by completing a Change of Program form. The University does not refund fees automatically in the event of a course cancellation.

#### Academic information

Processing of general registration, late registration, adds, drops withdrawals, and other academic transactions related to Summer Sessions enrollment will take place in the Summer Sessions Office.

The office hours are 8:00 a.m. - 6:30 p.m., Monday through Thursday during the first week of both sessions and 8:00 a.m. - 6:00 p.m. and 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. on Fridays, throughout the remainder of the summer. The office is closed on weekends and on July 4.

#### **Maximum Student Unit Load**

The total units a summer student may earn:

Session 1	7 units
Session 2	7 units
Sessions 1 and 2 1	0 units

Exceptions to the above are based on proven academic ability and the feasibility of the student's schedule. Students wishing to exceed these unit limits must obtain and complete a special petition available in the Summer Sessions Office and request permission from the dean of the school governing their major. Visiting students or non-matriculated students must request permission from the Director of Summer Sessions.

#### **General Studies**

The general Studies program is the nucleus of the undergraduate curriculum at CSUDH, deliberately structured to provide the intellectual and effective foundation required of a welleducated person. The philosophy underlying General Studies offerings is that they are courses for non-specialists, presenting subject matter related to wider context of knowledge and stimulating interest in lifelong learning. General Studies courses present breadth, deal with representative concepts, and provide some integration of concepts.

Several of the courses which comprise this curriculum are offered in Summer Sessions. These General Studies courses are designated by the "GS"symbol next to the Schedule number. For an overview of the General Studies program consult the University Catalog, pages 80 - 87 available in the University Bookstore.

#### University Advisement Center

Regularly enrolled students may obtain academic advisement for their summer schedules during Spring Semester when faculty and advisors are available. The Summer Sessions Office does not provide academic advisement. Any student wishing to enroll in a School of Management 500-level course must receive approval and signature form the MBA Program Office located in SAC 2149




### **Course Numbering System**

The course numbering system for the University is based upon three-digit numbers as follows:

100-199	Lower division courses, normally
	taken in the freshman year.
200-299	Lower division courses, normally
	taken in the sophomore year.
300-399	Upper division courses, normally
	taken in the junior year.
400-499	Upper division courses, normally
	taken in the senior year.
500-599	Graduate courses, normally limited
	to graduate students.

#### **High School Students**

Qualified high school students who will enter the junior or senior year in Fall 1994 can register for Summer Sessions lower division (100 level) courses with a letter of recommendation from the school principal or counselor and written authorization from the parents. Address letters to the Dean of Extended Education, California State University, Dominguez Hills. Students pay regular summer fees, and the course credit they earn may be applicable to a degree from CSUDH or another institution.

#### Academic Information

#### **Grade Reports and Transcripts**

Student performance in each course is reported at the end of the Session by one of the following grades (with grade points earned):

The following grades are to be used for approved courses only:

CR Credit (not counted in grade average, but units allowed). Undergraduate level only. SP Satisfactory Progress (credit is differed until completion of course sequence). NC No Credit (not counted in GPA, no units allowed).

A report of final grades assigned in classes will be mailed to you about three weeks after the end of the session.

A student may obtain an official transcript of enrollment and grades upon completing a Request for Transcript available at the office of Records and Registration. This request should be filed no earlier than the last week of the session in which the student is enrolled. Allow at least three weeks after the end of the session for delivery of the transcript copy. A fee of \$4.00, payable at the Cashier's Office, is charged for the first transcript request. Transcripts are not issued to a student whose record indicates financial obligation to the University.

Grades for nonstandard-date courses will be posted with standard course grades at end of Session.

#### Audit

Summer students may audit a course on a space available basis with the permission of the instructor. Auditors pay regular course fees. To enroll as an auditor, the student must submit a Change of Program form with the instructor's signature to the Summer Sessions Office.

Students must officially change their status in a course from credit to audit by the end of the first week of instruction.

#### Credit / No Credit Grading

In accordance with the current Credit / No Credit policies, the undergraduate Credit (CR) grade is the equivalent of an A, B or C letter grade, and the No Credit (NC) grade is the equivalent of a C-, D or F. CR / NC grades are recorded on student transcripts. An undergraduate may elect to be graded CR/NC in particular courses, subject to conditions which are described in the University Catalog. To receive a Credit / No Credit grade in a Summer Sessions course (except when the course is graded solely on Credit / No Credit basis), the student must complete the Credit / No Credit form, available in the Summer Sessions Office by the end of the second week of instruction.

#### **Independent Study**

Independent or directed study courses are intended for the regularly enrolled, matriculated students in order to enhance or supplement their curriculum. To enroll for independent or directed study, the student must obtain a contract from the Summer Sessions Office. This contract must be completed, including the signature of Dean, and submitted with student's registration. A student will not be registered for independent or directed study unless a completed contract has been submitted. Only course numbers listed with departments may be used; be sure the correct Session and number of units are on the contract. The same registration deadlines and policies apply to independent study.

#### **Final Examinations**

Final examinations are administered during the final week the course is scheduled to meet. Usually the examination is given on the last day the the course meets. No adds or drops are accepted during or after the last week the class meets.

#### Entry Level Mathematics (ELM) Requirement

CSU students wishing to enroll in any Summer Sessions mathematics classes will have to provide evidence of having satisfied the ELM requirements. This requirement can be satisfied by any of the following methods.

 Having an ELM score which meets the minimum for placement in a particular class.
Satisfactory test score on ACT / SAT test.
A transcript showing passing grades on a college level mathematics course above the level of Intermediate Algebra.

Contact math department for prerequisite clearance

Visitors from other Universities / Colleges should bring evidence that they have met the prerequisites for the course they wish to take.

#### **Student Services**

The Donald P. and Katherine B. Loker University Student Union opened to the Dominguez Hills community in the fall of1992. Its purpose is to provide a dynamic educational, social, recreational, and cultural environment for residential and commuter students, faculty, administrators and the community. It is intended that the University Student Union's facilities, programs and services will play a central role in enriching University life and contribute to out-of-classroom learning experiences. It is a pedestrian crossroads of the campus community and its activities.

The University Student Union houses the office of the Director, Students Activities, the Associated Students Inc., Bookstore and Campus Dining. Services available include, Food Court and Cafeteria, Bistro, Bookstore, television rooms, recreation room (billiards, ping pong, video and board games), a variety of lounges and meeting rooms. All vehicles which park on this campus must display a valid parking permit. (Sec. 21113a CVC). Summer Parking permits are purchased from the dispensing machines located at: Lot 1, Information Booth, Lot 3a, Lot 3 and Lot 4. (Should a dispensing machine malfunction, lease contact the Information Booth attendant or call the University Police at 516-3639, or use an emergency call box.) Vehicles are to park "head in" using marked stalls only.

Daily (\$1.50) parking permits must be displayed on the vehicle's dashboard. Summer Session permits are displayed inside the front windshield on the driver's side near the VN plate. This "static" type permit can be removed and transferred to another vehicle if the need arises. Permits must be displayed in plain view without obstruction. Car covers are not recommended.

Motorcycles, scooters, and mopeds have special areas for parking: SW corner of Lot 2, SE corner of Lot 3 and NW corner of Lot 4. Visitor parking areas are located in the front of the Small College Complex, outside of Lot 3a on the north perimeter road, and the gymnasium lot. These stalls are free, no permit required for 30 minutes.\*


Loading zones are located adjacent to major campus buildings. No permit is required for 30 minute parking.\*

Those who receive parking citations are reminded that pursuant of Sec. 40202 and 40500 CVC, these citations cannot be cancelled or rescinded by the University Police. Failure to resolve a parking citation will result in difficulty with renewal of the vehicle's registration.

### ONE YEAR OF ORGANIC CHEMISTRY

Designed for premedical and pre-dental students, this ten- week program corresponds to a full year of organic chemistry with lab. The two sequential courses offer 8 semester units the required chemistry for professional schools. The course is helpful in preparing for the DAT and MACT. **Students who enroll for the entire 10 week program will have priority registration.** 

#### **Upper Division**

#### CHE 300 Organic Chemistry I (3) (Summer Only).

Prerequisite : CHE 112 or 1 year of general Chemistry

A detailed study of organic molecular structure, reaction mechanisms sterochemistry, and synthesis with emphasis on a aliphatic and aromatic systems. Three hours of lecture per week.

CHE 301 Organic Chemistry Laboratory I (1) (Summer Only).

Prerequisites: CHE 112 or I year of general chemistry; concurrent enrollment in CHE 300.

Basic experimental techniques of organic chemistry. Three hours of laboratory per week.

#### CHE 302 Organic Chemistry 11 (3) (Summer Only).


Prerequisites: CHE 300 and CHE 301. Concurrent enrollment in CHE 303.

Continuation of CHE 300 with emphasis on the chemistry of organic compounds containing oxygen and nitrogen. Three hours of lecture per week.

#### CHE 303 Organic Laboratory II (1)(Summer Only).

*Prerequisites*: CHE 112 or 1 year of generalchemistry; concurrent enrollment in CHE 302.

Preparation of organic compounds and qualitative organic analysis. Three hours of laboratory per week.

#### HEALTH IN PUBLIC EDUCATION HEA 300-61 PAMELA KROCHALK JUNE 6 - JULY 16

Health Education is a required course for professional multiple or single subject clear credential teaching applicants. The course covers all topics designated in the Health Framework for California including nutrition, the physiological and sociological effects of substance abuse, cardiopulmonary resuscitation, and child abuse.

The primary function of this course is to enhance the school teacher's ability to promote positive health behavior among their students. The course will review current health issues, identify appropriate grade level teaching methods to promote positive health behaviors, identify community and school health resources, review



legal issues, and provide CPR certification. Included in this course will be directed teaching activities, individual/group presentations and cooperative learning activities.

#### GED 508 SEMINAR IN EDUCATION: African American Heritage for Education

This 3-unit independent study course, taught by Muriel Carrison, fulfills LAUSD (& surrounding districts) salary step reqs. for a 3-unit course on a specific ethnic group. Students may select Mexican American, Vietnamese American, and other ethnicities while they explore traditions, politics, past & current coping mechanisms, current legislation, leaders and personalities.

Class meets as a group in 1st week to plan projects, thereafter to discuss progress.






