OTD CAPSTONE COORDINATOR




DR. SHERYL RYAN

Since graduating from the CSUDH MSOT program in 2020, Loree joined the Lifestyle Redesign for Chronic Conditions Lab at USC Chan Division of Occupational Science and Occupational Therapy as a PhD student under the guidance of Dr. Beth Pyatak. Her primary work in the lab involves being a research assistant on the Function and Emotion in Everyday Life with Type 1 Diabetes (FEEL-T1D) study, the first large-scale study to integrate continuous glucose monitoring (CGM), ecological momentary assessment (EMA), and accelerometry to disentangle the short-term dynamic relationships between blood glucose, function, and emotional well-being in adults with type 1 diabetes. In addition to gaining more experience in Lifestyle Redesign, Loree also became a certified Diplomat of the American College of Lifestyle Medicine and she hopes to grow the profession's role in utilizing lifestyle management for the reversal of disease, prevention, and well-being.

REMEMBERING DR. SUSIE WYATT

(1953-2022)

Susana, or better known to her friends and colleagues as "Susie," passed away on October 4, 2022, having lost a year long battle with pancreatic cancer. She is survived by her daughter (Jacqui), son-in-law (Trevor), 3 grandsons (David, Tyler, Ryan) and son, John.

Susie was born as a fraternal twin along with 3 other siblings, to a physician father, Andres, of Hungarian extraction, and a Colombian mother, Evie, who was a phlebotomist. Susie grew up speaking Spanish, having moved from Bogota, Colombia to Chicago as a young girl. Her bicultural background served her well in both her roles as educator and occupational therapist working with high risk adolescents.

Susie's first career was as a high school teacher, often sharing fond memories of her baseball coaching and driver's training days. During these early years, Susie acquired her Masters Degree in Counseling. In between these academic pursuits, she obtained a certificate in dog training which was a commonly shared love of ours, she for her Bouviers and mine for Akitas.

Married and later divorced, Susie began her career and education at Loma Linda University. She and I first met there as I taught the psycho-social courses. Upon her graduation, I offered Susie her first OT position at Masada Homes located in Carson, CA. It was here that Susie began her professional journey utilizing her passion and her teaching in engaging adolescents. But even more keen was her curiosity of the unaddressed sensory regulation issues within this population. She carried this interest into a locked mental health facility engaging youth with serious and chronic mental health disorders. Here, she utilized a sensory regulation program which she found to lessen the numerous physical take-downs while finding key interventions that supported the youth's search for wellness and competence.

As I began the self study process to accredit the BS program in Occupational Therapy at CSUDH, Susie was one of the first faculty I recruited. She taught courses which are now known as Activities Across the Lifespan, Group Dynamics and later Research. She instituted our program's first research day and the OT program gained notoriety on campus for being one of the few majors who encouraged research at the undergraduate level.

Susie served on several OTAC committees over the years. She also organized and planned one of Claudia Allen's annual 3-day weekend workshops supporting her ongoing research on cognitive disability.



Her final landing, before retiring at the end of 2021, was initially as a staff OT at the LA County Augustus Hawkins Hospital in Compton. It was here over an eight year span, Susie was formally recognized by lead psychiatrists, nurses and the rehab team for her astounding statistic of 90-95% reduction in patient take-downs, used when adolescents could not independently reduce their outbursts. She was asked to provide formal presentations to the LA County Board of Supervisors, unit staff and medical interns/residents.

Susie consistently remained a "shining" advocate in teaching and training of OT Fieldwork Level I and II students, always seeking a continual stream from CSUDH. Because of her unique approach and teaching strategies, two of CSUDH OT graduates are currently employed there. Upon Susie's retirement, CSUDH alumnus, Olivia Kardos, was given the task of taking over the Adolescent Unit that was Susie's pride and joy. Susie so proudly spoke of Olivia's talents and skills in working with the adolescents on this unit.

Susie obtained her OTD in May of 2021, just months away from receiving news of her diagnosis. This was a hallmark event that only heralded the work she had already been recognized and acknowledged for in her career and work setting. She had hoped to apply for the Director of Rehab Services within the hospital to further the leadership and advancement of OT within the L.A. County Mental Health system.

The OT's, many who travelled from as far as Yucaipa and Aliso Viejo, at Susie's Celebration of Life shared "Susie stories", tears, and thoughts of this amazing, intelligent, caring, and endearing woman. As one of my "besties", Susie was always quick with a pun, ecstatic to share her connections with her grandchildren/children and the youth she worked with; inspiring to her many fieldwork students, passionate with her need to continually learn, and "authentic" as both an occupational therapist and human being!

I was lucky to have Susie as my CI in the Spring of 2019 on the adolescent unit at Augustus F. Hawkins inpatient psychiatric hospital, and soon after as my mentor when I began working there after graduation. Susie was a true educator at heart. She loved teaching and it came naturally to her. You were constantly learning from her, even when you didn't realize you were. She gave her students the space to make mistakes and encouraged us to learn from them. Susie was always upfront and honest with you and we looked forward to the daily "debriefs", even if we knew some hard truths were coming from her because they were always constructive.

Susie also believed in having a work/life balance and always said "work hard, play hard". She discouraged us from completing work at home and encouraged us to do something fun for ourselves on the weekends. She was invested in several hobbies such as beading and archery, and also valued her daily video chats with her grandsons.

I envisioned many more years of being able to learn from her, but I am grateful for and cherish the time I did have. Thank you Mama Bear Susie for all that you offered me, the field of OT, and all the kids you helped as a pioneer youth mental health OT.

"My Therapist Is The Trees": A Phenomenological Study

Introduction

- Since the COVID-19 pandemic, depression and anxiety have significantly increased. Disruption in daily activities or occupations create feelings of meaninglessness. This is a matter of spiritual urgency.
- While the domain of occupational therapy includes spirituality, many OTs report difficulties addressing spiritual engagement in interventions.

Research Question

How does nature contribute to spirituality for people with symptoms of depression and anxiety?

Methodology

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CSUDH | OCCUPAT OCCUPATIONAL

Key Concepts

Spirituality: A deep experience of meaning brought about by engaging in occupations that involve the enacting of personal values and beliefs, reflection, and intention within a supportive contextual environment.

NBOT: Nature-based interventions have been used by therapists in a variety of mental health settings and have been shown to have positive effects on those struggling with symptoms of anxiety and depression.

Results

Researchers coded for commonalities. Four major themes emerged:



"I get really bad depression and anxiety and I've been in kind of a funk... so today I went for a walk in the woods and it's like my theraphist is the trees. As soon as I'm in the forest, all my worries kind of melt away..." (Research Participant)



2. Nature provides connection
"I feel spiritual when I'm out in nature, basking in God's creation, just
with the elements. like the sun, wind, trees. I find that there are spirits
around us." (Research Participant)



3. Spirituality is ineffable



4. Spirituality is a practice

•• Spirituality is a practice. If haven't been particularly spiritual in the last few years. I've been very busy. I just feel somewhat disconnected in the way that our lives are structured and the way that we live in houses with street lights and cars and roads and buildings." (Research Participant)


- · Nature contributed to the spirituality of participants by infusing their lives with connection and meaning and decreasing symptoms of anxiety and depression.
- Participants were comfortable and even energized talking about spirituality regardless of struggling with the words to describe it, perhaps because nature was used as the doorway into the spirituality conversation.
- Keeping spirituality central within occupational therapy models may reduce the risk of therapist and client "becoming depersonalized automatons on a health care production line" (Bremault-Phillips, 2018).

Implications for OT

- · Participants experienced healing and increased wellbeing by connecting with their spirituality in nature
- Spirituality must be consistently practiced. To address this, we recommend taking interventions into nature, or bringing nature into the intervention, to facilitate spiritual

Saba Rezvani and Chris Simmons presented their poster titled, "Tattoos and stilettos: A visual exploration about the meaning of clothing for disabled adults." This qualitative study explored how clothing impacts people living with disabilities, beyond simply posing limitations with the physical act of dressing.

Highlight: Integrating Cultures through Occupational Therapy



ICOT was happy to hold the first speaker series of the year focusing on occupational therapy in an international setting. We welcomed Laura Deary and Dawn Hironaka to share their experiences of teaching in Ukraine to PTs, RNs, and neurologists.

Laura and Dawn spoke of the role of occupational therapy in the rehabilitation setting. Utilizing innovative thinking and their expertise, they strategized and adapted occupational therapy practices for accessibility of Ukrainians in everyday life. This was a valuable opportunity for students to learn more about creating interventions in unfamiliar environments and using a client-centered approach in new cultures.

ICOT: BULGARIA INTEREST MEETING



ICOT hosted a Bulgaria Interest Meeting consisting of a presentation on Bulgaria by Dr. Paul Penoliar and testimonies by C17 students who participated in this past year's trip. Chris Simmons, Aracelli Villareal, and Jenna Leland of C17 were invited to speak with C18 about their experiences in Bulgaria.

We had the opportunity to learn about the Ukrainian people and culture, as well as, the students' experiences with pediatric and geriatric conditions, implementation of interventions, collaboration with various professionals on the care team, and the takeaways they found most important. Hearing C17's perspectives on their experiences were informative and insightful. We hope this discussion will further inform C18's decision-making regarding participation in the 2023 Bulgaria trip.
