2025 FIELDWORK EDUCATORS WORKSHOP OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY, ETHICS AND FIELDWORK

FEBRUARY 7, 2025

The CSUDH Occupational Therapy Department was pleased to host our annual Fieldwork Educators Workshop on February 7, 2025. Our topic this year was Öccupational Therapy, Ethics and Fieldwork" and focused on ethical situations experienced in fieldwork and the use of Artificial Intelligence (AI) in fieldwork. Guest speakers were Dr. Lora Woo, Dr. Sheryl Ryan and Dr. Daniel Swiatek, all faculty members at CSUDH.



In her presentation titled: Back to Basics: AOTA's Code of Ethics. Moral Courage in Action," Dr. Woo reviewed the AOTA Code of Ethics including the Core Values, Principles and Standards of Conduct. She then presented several examples of how the principles would be applied and provided ethical dilemmas for discussion. Attendees then participated in a short quiz on the AOTA Code of Ethics answering the quiz questions using a "scratcher card" in an activity very similar to how our students learn about ethics in Dr. Woo's classes.

The final application of the information involved individual groups reviewing and discussing an ethical dilemma and determining which solution (A, B or C) best addressed the dilemma. By holding up




placards with the letters, groups shared their decisions with others. A breakout session with Dr. Gina Phelps and Dr. Lisa Hiestand provided more opportunities to discuss ethical dilemmas experienced at different sites. Several attendees reported in the survey that the sessions were a good reminder to refer to the AOTA Code of Ethics and reflect on how to incorporate the values and principles into practice. When asked if their approach or perspective regarding ethical dilemmas would be different than before the workshop, 87% of attendees said that it would be and provided many examples for fieldwork.

During his breakout sessions, Dr. Swiatek asked the question, What's Inside the California Occupational Therapy Practice Act? It's Your Responsibility to Know." He reviewed several pertinent regulations from the California Code of Regulations.



Prior to the workshop, attendees were asked to take a survey about their experience in the use of AI. More than 70% reported little to no experience with AI and only 8 respondents reported having an AI policy at their site. Dr. Ryan's presentation, "AI in OT Fieldwork: Navigating the Promise and Pitfalls", showed how AI is changing healthcare and the workplace. She discussed the limitations, pitfalls and tradeoffs of using AI and encouraged participants to consider implementing an AI policy at their sites. During her breakout sessions. AI Sandbox: Experimenting with Tech Tools", Dr. Ryan provided several opportunities for attendees to learn how to critique intervention AI-generated plans. goals, SOAP notes and assessment plans. She also provided resources for writing AI policies. In the post survey, most respondents reported that they felt more clear about communicating with students or making choices about when to use AI in fieldwork.



The OT fieldwork team values our fieldwork educators and appreciates that they are willing to attend our workshops in person and collaborate with each other to provide truly meaningful learning experiences for our students. Thank you!

OTAC TEA WITH A SCHOLAR FEBRUARY 15, 2025



Attending the 2025 OTAC Tea with a Scholar event was a great experience. I have always been curious about how occupational therapy is applied in different cultural settings, and Dr. Bonnie Nakasuji's presentation regarding cultural humility was very insightful. Her descriptions and reflections of her multiple times in Ghana encouraged me to think beyond my values shaped by my own cultural background. One point that really stuck with me was how perspectives on time can vary based on cultures. In one Ghana community, for instance, attending to an urgent need in the village might take priority over being on time for an OT appointment. In one specific case, a client was even several hours late to meet with Dr. Nakasuji. Knowing that different cultures may prioritize different things can remind occupational therapists to be patient, flexible, and communicative with their clients in order to provide them with optimal care. Additionally, throughout the event, I had the chance to meet multiple occupational therapy professionals and students who were all so kind and genuine. It was cool seeing a variety of passionate OTs attending this event, from seasoned therapists and professors to retirees. This was the 21st OTAC Tea with a Scholar event, and I was impressed to hear that some of them had participated since the first Tea with a Scholar in 2001! Overall, I left this event with more exposure to the warmhearted OT community, as well as a deeper appreciation and understanding for cultural fluidity in occupational therapy. I enjoyed my time there, and I look forward to the continuation of this yearly OTAC Tea with a Scholar tradition!

Listening to Dr. Nakasuji's experiences definitely broadened my idea of what was possible within the guidelines of OT and also gave me a better understanding of how much our practice benefits the community and vice versa. 

Sam Nesthus is a private practice occupational therapy practitioner who specializes in promoting sensory health. sustainable self-care. and overall well-being for parents. She works with manv neurodivergent families, in particular parents of children with sensory processing differences, autism spectrum disorder. attentiondeficit/hyperactivity disorder, anxiety, and/or challenges with regulation. Oftentimes these parents are on their own path of self-discovery regarding their neurodivergence thev as begin to better understand their neurodivergent child. Through one-on-one consultation and coaching, monthly parent support groups, and specialized group series, Sam helps parents explore and understand their own sensory preferences and regulatory needs.

She works collaboratively with clients to improve their selfawareness, utilize regulatory tools and strategies, modify their schedules and environments, and simplify family life to bring balance to their daily experiences.

Sam is SIPT-certified and spent her initial seven years of practice working in pediatrics at an outpatient sensory integration clinic. As a mom of two young kids, she knows firsthand about the stress of parenting in today's world. When working with parents, she incorporates topics such as societal expectations and cultural values surrounding motherhood. interoceptive awareness, boundary setting, self-compassion,

identification of personal values, and mindfulness. She has a neurodivergentaffirming and traumainformed approach and helps parents create а family environment where unique nervous everyone's system is honored. Although reactive regulation strategies are discussed, most of her work emphasizes proactive lifestyle choices that support regulation so that parents can avoid burnout and feel equipped to tackle daily life.
