Faculty Spotlight

This year we welcome Dr. Jeb Middlebrook to the department. I asked Dr. Middlebrook to answer some questions about his research interest and his experiences in graduate school. Here's what he has to say:

I) For our newest students, can you tell us about your academic background and your current research interests?

I earned a Ph.D. and M.A. (2011, 2007) in American Studies and Ethnicity from the University of Southern California, and a B.A. (2003) in Ethnic Studies (Individually Designed Interdepartmental Major) from the University of Minnesota. At CSUDH, I teach "Criminology," "Deviant Behavior," "Social Movements," "Sociology of Hip-Hop," and "Introduction to Sociology," among other courses. My research and teaching interests include: race and ethnicity, prison, community organizing, and music; and I approach these topics through the frameworks of intersectionality (connections among race, class, gender, and sexuality), transnationalism (flows and movements across borders), and interdisciplinarity (research and teaching across disciplinary boundaries).

2) What can you tell us about your decision to pursue a PhD?

My decision to pursue a Ph.D. was motivated by the many sides of myself: academic, artist, activist. I wanted a career that would allow me the time and space to bring together these seemingly separate parts of my life in powerful and meaningful ways. Studying and practicing the connections among academics, art, and activism as a graduate student, and now as a university professor, is an amazing privilege and one that I hope to mobilize to create such opportunities for others to present their full selves to the world.

3) What do you enjoy the most about teaching?

I most enjoy teaching students how to formulate their own research questions and to collect and analyze data to sufficiently answer questions they are asking about the world. In other words, I enjoy helping to produce a new generation of scholars!

4) What advice do you have for our current graduate students? Do you have a favorite survival strategy to share?

Ask questions, in class and in your research, that you really want to know the answer to. In this way, make graduate school work for you. An academic mentor once said to me, ask questions that "bite into your existence." This was my survival strategy - to always ask questions that mattered to me. That's what kept me reading, writing, and redrafting; the drive to want to know the answer to questions that really were very personal, but at the same time had relevance to the larger world. Ask yourself and those around you the hard questions, and school (and life) will become very exciting.



I) Could you tell us about how you decided to earn your MA in sociology at CSUDH?

While studying towards my BA degree in sociology, I found every sociology class interesting. I was able to relate to the topics discussed in class and every sociology class, concept, and theory helped me to understand the world and people around me better. My professors at CSUDH noticed my interest in sociology and suggested me to achieve more than just a BA degree. In addition, they informed me that with an MA in sociology I would be more marketable in the job market. As a result, I decided to earn an MA in sociology.



2) How many years were you in the program? What was your emphasis? Did you work with one faculty member or several?

I was in the MA program for a year and emphasized in general sociology. Throughout my education in CSUDH, I worked with almost all the professors in the sociology department. Many of them took their time to tutor and/or mentor me on a one-on-one basis.

3) Tell us about what you are doing now? How long have you been in your current place of employment?

I am currently working at a community college as a sociology professor. I have been teaching for a year and a half now. Also, I got hired early this year as a mentor coordinator at a prisoner re-entry program, helping ex-offenders integrate back into society after being released from jail or prison.

4) What advice do you have for current graduate students in terms of surviving the graduate program?

My best advice that I have for current graduate students in terms of surviving the graduate program is to communicate with professors all the time. Let them know about your struggles, confusions, and interest in the program. All this information is useful so professors can guide you in the right direction and provide you with the help that you need. Also, keep in mind that you have a personal life besides school and it is important to reward yourself when you achieve or complete something as a form of motivation.

I) Could you tell us about how you decided to earn your MA in sociology at CSUDH?

I had just completed my MS in Public Administration at Cal State Long Beach and I wanted to continue my education and earn a degree that would allow me to teach at a community college and Cal State University. I explored a number of options and decided to pursue my MA in Sociology because I had earned my BA in Sociology at Cal State Los Angeles and I remembered that I really enjoyed the classes and I felt that the MA in Sociology would compliment my MS in Public Administration. My decision to pursue my MA in Sociology at Cal State Dominguez Hills was rather simple because I wanted to attend a university where the professors had a genuine desire to teach and a personal investment in my education. I also felt that the diversity (socio-economic, ethnic and gender) at Cal State Dominguez Hills would further enhance my overall learning experience.

2) Tell us about what you are doing now? How long have you been in your current place of employment?

I recently resigned from my position at the University of Nevada, Las Vegas because I have a 6 month old son who lives in Los Angeles with my girlfriend and to serve as the Interim Director of Admissions at Don Bosco Technical Institute aka Bosco Tech, an all-male, preengineering Catholic high school in Rosemead, CA. In addition to the Director of Admissions position, I also accepted two adjunct faculty positions, one at Los Angeles Harbor College and the other at the College of Southern Nevada. I am teaching Human Sexuality (Sociology Course) and Introduction to Sociology. I have been in my current position for less than I month. My goal within the next year is to join a Sociology department at a Cal State University, preferably my alma mater, Cal State Dominguez Hills.

3)What advice do you have for current graduate students in terms of getting a job after graduation?

The job market is scarce and finding a job is challenging. Pursue your passion and put your Sociology degree to work. Volunteer or accept part-time positions at non-profit organizations to enhance your resume. Highlight your strengths, you have been taught how to be a research and have a very unique way of observing the world. Employers are looking for employees that can do more than just develop or analyze theories, therefore promote yourself in a way that illustrates that you can work in a diverse and challenging environment and can effectively communicate ideas with others.
